VR Fish/MAA Delegate Report

Two million native fish for second year running

For the second consecutive year the Victorian Government has stocked more than two million native fish into lakes and rivers to improve recreational fishing opportunities across Victoria. Fisheries Victoria stocked 81 lakes and rivers with native fish last financial year.

More than one million of the fish were golden perch and 885,000 were Murray cod, as well as Australian bass, silver perch, estuary perch and Macquarie perch. Most of these fish were released as fingerlings and will take three to five years to reach legal minimum size, depending on the species.

However, anglers won't need to wait that long due to already productive freshwater fisheries. The extensive stocking of Nagambie Lakes is beginning to yield results with

legal size golden perch caught last summer by local club anglers. More than 900,000 native fish have been stocked into the Nagambie Lakes since 2009.

Stockings of Australian bass in Gippsland are also showing encouraging signs with catches of fish in Blue Rock Lake, the Macalister River and Lake Glenmaggie last summer.

The fishing licence funded *Murray Cod Million project* at Lake Eildon is also progressing well. Two thirds of those cod have been stocked and bait fishers have already reported catches of small fish.

Lake Eildon has a long history of Murray cod stocking since the 1990s so anglers don't even have to wait for these million fish to grow. Several giant cod measuring more than one metre have been landed in recent months and the lake has a growing reputation that should only improve when these recently stocked fish reach size.

Anglers are reminded that the three month closed season for Murray cod began at the start of September and runs through to the end of November.

Fish cleaning table for Blind Bight anglers

Recreational fishers returning to the Blind Bight boat ramp can now clean their catch more easily thanks to a new fish cleaning table funded by the Victorian Government.

Blind Bight is a popular launching spot for anglers chasing snapper, King George whiting, gummy shark and flathead.

The new fish cleaning table features a roof to protect anglers from the elements and a tap and hose for washing down their catch and the table.

Fisheries Victoria has installed more than 35 fish cleaning tables across the state in recent years ranging from Nelson in the far west to Mallacoota in the east.

The Blind Bight fish cleaning table was funded by the Recreational Fishing Initiative, which aims to improve angling access and facilities, build fishing platforms, construct reefs and boost fish stocking in inland waters.

Range Extension Database Map (Redmap)

One of the indicators of marine climate change is the large scale redistribution of species; as the environment changes, species shift because of their preferred environmental conditions.

This is happening faster in the ocean compared to land, and species are moving greater distances where the warming is greater - such as the south east of Australia, which is an internationally recognised climate change hotspot.

Examples of species that appear to be undergoing an extension in their range in Victoria and New South Wales include the long spined sea urchin, stripey tuna, wahoo, Spanish mackeral and mahi mahi.

Over 4 million Australians go fishing, diving and boating each year. Fishers are the 'eyes and ears' of the marine environment, but they do not always have a way of communicating this valuable information to scientists. Redmap provides a tool for fishers and divers to help record and track observations of species caught or observed outside their usual distribution using an on line website. Redmap is currently running in Tasmania and will be expanded to cover the South East of Australia (including Victoria) in November 2012.

As new observations are reported over time this will build a picture of changes occurring in the marine environment and has the potential to play a vital role in directing management decisions and actions.
